Prepare for Application Month

Want to make college application season less stressful? Spend plenty of time researching colleges to find the best fit for you. Make a very thoughtful, realistic list of about 10 colleges. Remember to have 2-3 safety schools, 2-3 match/on target schools, and 2-3 reach/wildcard schools.

CSU campuses that are not impacted are often very good safety schools. Take a look at these CSUs: Bakersfield, Channel Islands, Dominguez Hills, East Bay, Maritime, and Stanislaus.

Is your email professional? If not, now is the time to set up a professional email account, perhaps including your first and last name and a number if necessary. Be aware of what you post on social media, your online reputation is just as important as your reputation in person. You never know what you might miss out on because of poor judgment online.

Check your email often, especially seniors, that's how you will find out about all college and scholarship information!

New for Naviance! On the login screen, click "Login with Clever", then select "Log in with Active Directory" and you will be automatically signed in with your school district user name and password.

⇒ SAT scores be sent to Cal State Apply 3594 and UC Merced 4129.

⇒ ACT scores be sent to CSU Stanislaus 0435 and UC Merced 0450.

We will be testing **Wednesday, October 16** in both Gyms, beginning at 7:15 a.m. SHARP! PSAT sales will be September 16—October 4 during both lunch periods or after school in the SBO. The PSAT fee is \$20.00* and must be paid at the time of registration.

*Juniors who are economically disadvantaged can receive a PSAT Fee waiver from Mrs. Cardoza (Quantities are limited, first come, first serve!)

Before you can register for classes after graduation, you must complete all entrance requirements: *(even if you've already taken classes at MJC, now that you are considered a high school graduate, you must complete the following)*

- Online Application
- Receive MJC ID# to set up Pirate's Net and MJC email account
- Orientation
- Meet with academic advisor to create an abbreviated Education Plan


Enrolling at MJC while in high school

In order to take classes at MJC, students must be on track to graduate. Students requiring summer school or ESS will not be allowed to enroll in concurrent classes at MJC. Students need to submit their application and waiver as soon as possible, class registration begins in November. Tuition is waived, fees are approximately \$30, plus books if required. See Mrs. Cardoza for course recommendations and more information. Steps to enrolling:

- Online Application
- Receive MJC ID# to set up Pirate's Net and MJC email account
- Complete and submit High School Petition to enroll
- Register for classes (on paper for Dual Enrollment, online for others)
- Only availability for fall at this point: Guidance 110 Class meets at MoHi in room 205 9/9—10/23 Mondays 3:15—4:20. See Mrs. Cardoza ASAP to register, limited availability for seniors only!

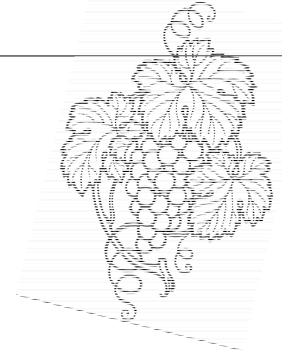

What’s in a Name?

It is crucial that you use your legal name on all school, college, and financial aid documents. Your legal name is what is printed on your birth certificate and/or social security card. As you transition from high school to college and the real world, you must use your legal name consistently in everything you do. This is especially important for students who have 2 last names, or go by middle names or nick names.

Your personal information on the transcript MUST match the information you list on your college and financial aid applications next year. If something needs to be changed, have your parents contact Raquel in the counseling office.

College Athletes

Seniors: If you haven’t registered with the NCAA clearinghouse yet, do so ASAP! See Mrs. Cardoza for more information. Juniors can register now too!

College Honors Programs

While considering which colleges to apply to, check out their scholar or honors programs. These programs are often highly competitive and seek students with high academic success and a strong commitment to their community. Be sure to let Mrs. Cardoza know which programs you are interested in. Some limit the number of applicants from a high school or require counselor recommendations.

Questbridge

A national program that matches OUTSTANDING low income seniors with admission and scholarships to the nation’s leading colleges. Students need to VERY strong academically and have demonstrated community service and leadership. This is a very competitive program recommended for students who are in the top 5-10% of their class, scored >1250 on the SAT (CR+M) or > 27 on ACT, family income less than \$60,000 per year, most often on free or reduced lunch, and most often the first in their family to attend college. The application process is very lengthy and requires letters of recommendation from a counselor and teachers.

Confirm your eligibility and get application info from Mrs. Cardoza BEFORE September 20.

College Applications

It's time to get started on those college applications! In order to avoid stress, get a start on them now. When you wait until the last minute, it creates a high stress situation. Although most applications are not available until October, you can find the website and set up your user account.

Set up your accounts on the application websites and bookmark the webpages to find them easily in the future. Be sure to write down the user name and password that you create.

Don't forget to sign up on Naviance for the application workshops. Go to the colleges tab, click on “view all upcoming college visits”, and then “sign up” to attend! Start to fill in the application the best you can BEFORE coming to the application workshop. Please don't waste time during workshop filling out the easy parts (name, address, etc.) that you can do on your own.

Ask your counselor for an unofficial copy of your transcripts to help you report your classes and grades on your college applications. Be sure to bring your transcript to the application workshop.

Application fees: **CSU \$ 70 per campus, UC \$ 70 per campus.** In order to qualify for a fee waiver, parent financial information must be provided on the application. Please be sure to have all information needed before saving that page on your online application, because once the page is saved, it cannot be changed. Private Universities vary up to \$100, and some accept the College Board fee waivers (4 issued to students who use a fee waiver on the SAT). MJC application is free.

Deadlines vary. Most require essay. Most require letters of recommendation from teachers and a counselor. Most require school reports from Mrs. Cardoza. **EXTREMELY IMPORTANT** for you to communicate with Mrs. Cardoza **EARLY** and **OFTEN** during the application process with private universities.
