The Financial Aid Journey Continues...

The deadline to submit FAFSA or Dream Act application is March 2, do not be late or you will miss out on financial assistance!

Cal Grant requires a GPA verification from your school. Modesto City Schools AUTOMATICALLY submits the GPA verification for ALL seniors and will submit for you again next year. Once you submit your application, watch your email for instructions to set up your Webgrants for Students account. Many colleges will be asking for additional financial aid information from you. Check your college portal. Remember that you will have to go through this process EVERY year that you are in college. Find the Financial Aid Office on your college campus to help you navigate this process!

The financial aid application only has space for you to list 10 colleges. Be sure that you list a California college in the first spot so that you will be considered for Cal Grant. If you are applying to more than 10 colleges, list your 10 most likely first and submit your financial aid application. Once you are able to log back on and make changes to your application (usually takes a day or two), then you can remove the colleges you already listed, and add the other colleges. They will ALL receive your information.

As many of you receive notification that you have received a scholarship or have been offered a scholarship from a university, please bring that in to Mrs. Cardoza so that you can be recognized at our **Awards Night on April 30**.

Some private universities require the **CSS Profile** through College Board. Check the university website (financial aid page) for information. There is an application fee for this. <https://student.collegeboard.org/css-financial-aid-profile>

COLLEGE NEWS

Check your college portal/email

Colleges mostly communicate with you through your student portal/account or through email. Be sure to check at least weekly. Pay attention to deadlines! Your admission may be revoked if you miss a deadline or requirement!

Why is it taking so long?

Although it seems like an eternity for you, realize that colleges and universities have THOUSANDS of applicants and it takes time for them to process all of those applications! It may take several weeks before your portal is updated with test scores received, transcripts, etc. Some colleges are sending out acceptance and denial letters, but many haven't completed their decision process yet. You're just going to have to be patient! Most universities will notify students by the end of March.

Update your Naviance College Application List

Make sure your list is up to date with all of the colleges that you applied to, including MJC. As you learn college acceptance/denials, please update your Naviance list. Mrs. Cardoza cannot submit transcripts to colleges until you list them on your Naviance "Colleges I am applying to" list.

CSU Math Success e-Learning Course

Open to current seniors who earned "Conditionally Ready" on the math EAP. Successfully completing this course will bring students from "Conditionally Ready" status to "Ready" status, and exempt them from having to take the Summer Early Start Class. What's in a Name?

It is crucial that you use your legal name on all school, college, and financial aid documents. Your legal name is what is printed on your birth certificate and/or social security card. As you transition from high school to college and the real world, you must use your legal name consistently in everything you do. This is especially important for students who have 2 last names, or go by middle names. If you have not been using your legal name at school or on any applications, you need to get that fixed immediately!

Transcripts and Mid Year Reports

Most CSUs and UCs do not want mid year (7th semester) transcripts. Log on to your student portal to find out the exact deadline to submit transcripts. Do not follow your friends on this, each student and college is different! If the deadline is in February, come see Mrs. Cardoza. If the deadline is after you graduate in May, then we will only need to send your transcript to the college that you attend, after graduation.

Most private colleges and universities (Common App) want a mid year report to see if anything has changed since you applied. The report has a few questions and is sent with your mid year transcript. Mrs. Cardoza completes all of the mid year reports. Deadlines vary by college.

Juniors and EAP Testing this spring

This test can be beneficial for you in college, at CSU and Community College. Do the very best you can! You are aiming for "Ready" score! There will also be an option on the test asking if you want your scores released to colleges, say yes! Your score does not affect whether or not you are admitted.

There are a lot of seniors this year saying that they wished they had taken this test more seriously last year. Don't let that be you!

College Athletes

Register with the NCAA Clearing House during your junior year. See Mrs. Cardoza to be sure you are meeting the more rigorous academic standards of NCAA. No summer school, no ESS, no PACE is accepted.

Seniors

Before you can register for classes after graduation, you must complete all entrance requirements: (even if you've already taken classes at MJC, now that you are considered a high school graduate, you must complete the following)

- Application— February 2 at MoHi or go online to apply now!
- Orientation—February 2 at MoHi, or can be completed online or at a MJC New Student Day
- Assessment Tests—on our campus February 9 or at MJC New Student Day, or at MJC testing center on west campus
- Meet with academic advisor—on our campus March 9, or at New Student Day, or make an appointment by calling MJC Counseling Office

Sign up for on campus workshops in Naviance, "colleges" tab, "view all upcoming visits".

MJC New Student Days

April 14 for students beginning in the summer, June 14 for students beginning in the fall. If you still need to complete any of the required items (application, orientation, assessment test, or meeting with an academic advisor), you will be able to do so on the new student day. There will also be parent information sessions and assistance with financial aid. Be there at 8:00 am.

Multiple Measures for Assessment

Students may now be eligible for college level work at MJC based on their EAP test (from junior year), or the CSU assessment, or ACT/SAT score, or AP/IB Exam scores! This is great news that will affect many of you! Read more information and download the required forms at

MJC Transfer Center

If you plan on transferring to a university, be sure to visit the Transfer Center in the East Campus Student Center EVERY semester! They can help you determine which classes are transferrable and help you with the transfer application process. Remember to take an average of 15 units (must be transferable) every semester.

What is your goal at MJC?

- **Transfer to a university**—complete the required 60 transferable units, and apply to a university in the semester before you finish at MJC. Students need 15 units every semester of transferrable classes in order to transfer in 2 years.
- **Obtain AA or AS Degree**—a 2 year degree can help you obtain a more desirable job and start a career. You can obtain the degree and transfer if you wish, it may take a few more classes.
- **Earn a Career Technical Education Certification**—only take classes that pertain to your career area, and earn a certificate to help you get a job in the industry. Can take 1-4 semesters.

Destination Medicine Pre-Med Conference

Sponsored by the Stanislaus Medical Society and the Stanislaus County Office of Education. Let's go Juniors! It's time to get registered for the SAT and/or the ACT (both with writing) this spring! I recommend that you take it once in the spring of your junior year, and again in the fall of your senior year. Take them both, since the tests are different and you may find that you do better on one test. Colleges will only look at your highest score. Go to the websites listed above, create a username & password that you will remember, you will need to log on to these websites again!

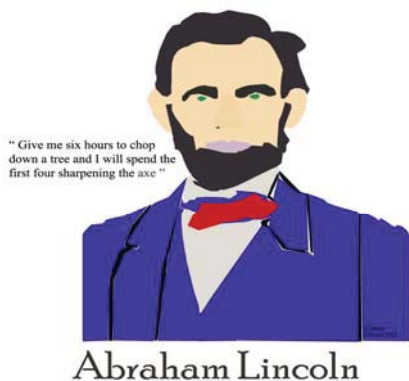
ACT Test Date:	April 14	June 9

Students on free or reduced lunch are eligible for a total of 2 SAT fee waivers and 2 ACT fee waivers. It's a good idea to use one the spring of your junior year and one in the fall of your senior year. Fee waivers are available in Mrs. Cardoza's office in the counseling department. AVID students will receive their fee waivers in AVID class.

You'll have to upload a photo of yourself for the admission ticket. Don't forget to print your admission ticket and bring a photo I.D. to the test!

Although you may not be sure where you apply to college yet, request that your scores be sent anyway! Use the codes below to have your scores sent to all CSUs and all UCs. It's free now, they will charge you later. If you end up taking the test again and getting a better score, this score will be ignored.

- For SAT, use code 3594 to send scores to Cal State Apply, and your scores are sent to ALL of the CSUs. Send to one UC and they will share with all UCs.
- For ACT, send scores to one CSU and one UC, scores will be shared with all campuses.

Writing a Professional Résumé

(or resumé or resume....)

First of all, what's up with the accent marks? You can ask your English teacher for the technical details, but the word is commonly understood whether you include one accent, two accents, or no accents. For the ease of typing this article, accent marks will be left off.

The most common reasons to write a resume at this age include: obtain a part time job, complete scholarship applications, and/or provide information to people writing you a letter of recommendation.

There is no exact formula in creating your resume, this article gives some general information to help get you started. There are typically 2 main components to a resume: **education and training**, and **work and/or other relevant experiences**. It is recommended that you keep your resume to one page in length, use an easy to read font, and format it so that your information can be quickly read. If you find that your resume is longer than one page, take off some of the older or less relevant experiences.

First, gather all of the information you will need to complete your resume. Make a list of all of your extra curricular activities. Include the years that you were involved, any offices held, awards won, and a brief description of what you specifically did or contributed. Keep a list of any part time jobs and volunteer work, the years that you worked there, and your duties.

Second, find a format that works for you. There are many examples on the internet and templates on Microsoft Word. Not all of the headings in the examples may pertain to you at this point, so you may need to adjust them. Each area of your resume should have a heading, with the information listed in a bulleted format. The bullets do not need to be complete sentences, concise information is preferred. Within each of the headings, list all information in reverse chronological order (with the most recent first).

- Your complete name, address, phone, and email should be in the main heading of the page.
- Many people list an objective as the first heading. You may develop a resume with the objective of obtaining employment, and another resume with the objective of obtaining a scholarship.
- List education and special trainings first. List the name of your high school and the year that you will graduate. You may want to include your high school GPA, any academic awards, and any special academic programs that you participated in. After you graduate from college, you will probably remove your high school information.
- Since most teenagers lack work experience, it's ok to list your extra curricular activities. List them in reverse chronological order. Really try to show how your participation in these activities relates to developing your leadership skills, work ethic, and professionalism. Quality is more important than quantity! As you develop more work experiences, you will remove many of these extra curricular activities.
- If you have work experience, list the name of the business that you worked for, the years that you worked there, and your specific job duties. If your work experience was on a volunteer basis, be sure to indicate that. Do not write long paragraphs, keep your descriptions concise.
- Many people use a heading for references. Some people actually include the names and contact information for 3 professional references, while others prefer to write "references available upon request".

Your resume is always a work in progress. With each year that you are in school, or each new activity, or work experience, you should update your resume. Updating includes adding in new experiences, removing outdated experiences, improving the format, etc. As an adult in the working world, you will continue to update your resume with professional training, leadership positions, and additional workplace skills.
